15. Multidisciplinary / interdisciplinary

a. Our mission towards MDS and IDS is expressed in our institute's motto `Dissemination of Education for Knowledge , Science and Culture''. Studying IDS i.e. interdisciplinary subjects enables the student to master not only a single subject but several subjects. Such education is useful for solving problems during difficult life situations. Multidimensional knowledge enhances critical thinking and cognitive development of students and interdisciplinary/multidisciplinary education provides them sound learning experience.

We already offer IDS, MDS and Value Added Courses to the students to some extent in all the Under Graduate Programs running in our college.e.g. Maps are used in Geography to understand wars and regimes in History. Indian and foreign language courses aid in understanding Humanities and Science subjects. Therefore, we offer subjects in such combinations that need of holistic education is catered to.

b. However, as per the new guidelines of UGC and NEP, it is necessary to provide MDS facility in the broader sense of the whole system in the colleges which has not been fully provided yet. The college has some technical difficulties in doing so. E.g. workload, work distribution, human expertise and several technical obstacles like NOC from University and government of

Maharashtra . Once these obstacles are sorted out, programmes delineating humanities and science with STEM will be introduced. We plan to tie up with the Engineering and Nursing College being run in the same campus by our parent institute for this purpose.

Under the guidance of BoS and Academic Council, the credit-based curricula is framed and revised every year which is flexible and innovative according to industry and community needs. All courses expect students to submit projects focusing the values related to community engagement and service and environmental education. E.g. Physics Department students undertake the project every year to calculate humidity and temperature in Mahalaxmi Temple, also the Kirnotsav of Mahalaxmi Temple is successfully carried out due to their surveys. They calculate surface tension of water at Rankala lake. Chemistry students go for soil testing. Computer Science students go to teach Municipality students. English department students go to teach sugar cane workers' children etc.

- d) We offer the flexibility of multiple entry and exit to students of 3 yrs degree programme with the provision to complete a programme within 6 years' period. With the onset of NEP they will be provided with the relaxation of 7 years instead of 6 years. Also, B.Voc. and Community College programmes run by our college have this facility of multiple entry and exit with diploma, advanced diploma and degree provision at every successive exit.
- e) To make our students and teachers aware of the pressing societal issues and challenges (local and global) and discuss solutions, our college organises FDPs, workshops and guest lectures. Multidisciplinary and innovative sustainable research is the need of our time. Therefore, we plan ot increase the number of these activities. Departments plan interdisciplinary individual/ departmental research projects, undertake case studies, arrange field visits. Under active linkages and collaborations with the industry, NGOs and national-international universities and institution, these activities will be organised rigorously. We intend to establish MoUs with organisations like MSDEED and IISER to impart research skills and innovative teaching-learning skills to teachers and students which will help us in finding solutions to the community issues and challenges through multi-disciplinary research.
- F) our institution promotes multidisciplinary/interdisciplinary approach already to some extent . this can be explained as -

- 1. The study of English language has been made compulsory for science, commerce and professional programmes.
- 2. Students of Commerce, B.B.A and BCA programs also study humanities (economics) and science subjects (statistics, mathematics) compulsorily.
- 3. B.A.Part II students study Environment Science as a compulsory subject and a project is also submitted.
- 4. Logical knowledge of Mathematics is imparted to the students of Arts through Logic.
- 5. The study of the history of social reform in Maharashtra i.e. HSRM and tourism has been made compulsory under the interdisciplinary curriculum.
- 6. In B.VoC. program, study of English subject is made compulsory.

The BoS Chairmen give more emphasis on the interdisciplinary as well as multidisciplinary approach.

The formation of value added courses has also been changed accordingly .Also, the principal and senior authority of the college have given standing orders to the BoS chairmen of all subjects, time table committee, admission committee regarding the implementation of IDS and MDS. Multidisciplinary courses can be implemented successfully if the restrictions imposed by universities and other similar entities are removed.

Project, case studies, field work have been adopted by the college in a very effective manner during the internal evaluation of students in various subjects.

16.Academic bank of credits (ABC):

ABC is considered a guaranteed way to achieve the objectives of NEP-2020. It provides the facility to register, preserve, and accumulate the credits and marks of all students of a Higher Education Institution (HEI) by getting all the Indian HEIs and universities registered in the ABC system.

Our college has generated its ABC ID through Digi Locker in

accordance with the guidelines of the University and UGC. The college has received a Login ID and password. Through mentoring activities, first-year students of all programmes are oriented about ABC and how to generate their individual ABC IDs.

In the traditional set of Higher Education, there were no possibilities for the internationalization of education or provision of joint degrees between Indian and foreign institutions. However, according to the changing needs and norms of the Government and education department, it is now possible for us to establish MoUs and active linkages with foreign universities for knowledge sharing. After the removal of technical hurdles from UGC and the university, our college will be able to transfer the credits of students.

17.Skill development:

- a. In accordance with the rules designed by the UGC, it is mandatory for students to study SEC skill enhancement courses and soft skill courses in order to obtain their degree. The college has formed a Skill Assessment Committee under the chairmanship of the Principal, in accordance with recent NSFQ guidelines, which takes action to successfully implement SEC and Soft Skill courses. This committee checks the career opportunities, the level of the courses, and their alignment with industry standards. The appropriateness of SEC and soft courses offered by each department is checked and implemented by the respective Deans.
- b. Currently, the college offers programs such as B.Voc. and Community College courses in Foundry Technology, Photography and Videography, Animation and Film Making, Graphic Design, CMLT, DMLT, M.Sc. Environmental Science, etc. as part of vocational training.
- c. The college instills the eternal values of humanity and life in students through Humanities, Political Science, History, Sociology, and Economics. To achieve this, the college celebrates Constitution Day, Voter's Day, Human Rights Day, and birth anniversaries of great thinkers and leaders of the era. On these occasions, the college works to instill human values in students through guest lectures by external experts. Additionally, all the departments of the college work to create social and moral awareness regarding various issues among students by organizing various group discussions, seminars, quiz competitions, essay writing, elocution competitions, and debates. The Department of

Political Science organizes SEC on Human Rights.

Sensitive issues are handled by the NSS and NCC departments of the college. The college continuously strives to instill social consciousness and good manners among students by organizing programs such as literacy campaigns, village cleanliness drives, blood donation drives, traffic safety campaigns, pollution-free environment initiatives, etc.

c. Skill-oriented and employment-oriented curriculum is the soul of higher education. During the creation and upgrading process of all our programs, feedback from stakeholders (industry, parents, and students) is taken, analyzed, and incorporated into the relevant curriculum. All BoS Chairmen are advised to focus on how the newly created courses can be flexible and innovative. Credits are given to project-based, community engagement-oriented, and value-based components while conducting internal evaluations of students through CIE.

Environmental science is compulsory in the second-year curriculum of all programs. We aim to instill social awareness in students by giving them community-related projects and case studies in this subject and strengthening their relationship with society.

We provide value-based education to students through NSS and NCC. An example of this is during the COVID-19 pandemic and the local flood in Kolhapur, our value-based education inspired students to perform community-oriented and useful work for society. For instance, Ms. Priyanka Patil (B.Sc. Part I) drove a hearse during the pandemic and was honored with many state and district level awards. She was appointed the ambassador of NSS by the Maharashtra government. A team of girls called the "Dream Team" provided food to the grief-stricken relatives of COVID-19 patients.

18.Appropriate integration of Indian Knowledge system (teaching in Indian Language, culture, using online course)

Marathi, Hindi, and English are adopted as the daily study and teaching language in the classroom so that students can understand and apply the knowledge of various subjects properly. Also, Marathi, Hindi, and English have been made compulsory subjects in the curriculum for the students to study, leading to the development of these Indian languages. The college tries to preserve and promote languages and inculcate an interest in languages, literature, and culture among students by organizing

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Marathi language conservation fortnight, Hindi week, and English week.

We also preserve and promote languages through various activities like Vachan Katta, Vangmay Mandal (literary association), posters on linguistics and literary topics, publication of Vivek News by students, and value-added courses like Modi script. Some exemplary activities are a guest lecture organized by the Department of Hindi - "Women and Dalit Discussions" by "Sushila Takbhaure," a research project on various aspects of tribal poetry and consciousness sanctioned to Dr. Mahat, professor of Hindi, by the college, and a National Research Seminar on "Vimukt aur Ghumantu Jansamudaya: Dasha aur Disha" organized by the Department of Hindi.

For the dissemination of ancient Indian traditional knowledge, the college has adopted the SEC course of Indology and Indography.

Indian Arts:

Students organize and participate in exhibitions like "Spandan," which is an annual platform for the artwork of B.Voc. students. The animation department has contributed to creating the Modi font for the MOOC on Modi Script, which will be launched on our LMS. Lectures and workshops on Indian art forms like calligraphy, music, dance, and theater are organized by the college to promote and preserve Indian culture.

19. Focus on Outcome based education (OBE): Focus on Outcome based education (OBE):

The college invites opinions from UG III and PG II students of different departments during various discussions as well as during Alumni Meet to get their feedback about the course. Meritorious alumni are also selected as members of BOS and we seek their inputs while designing the syllabus.

We have created the structure of OBE by harmonizing all the global issues, local needs, and institutional objectives. In this regard, all program outcomes are aligned with the vision and mission of the organization. Program-specific outcomes are then determined by the BOS of the concerned department. Also, course outcomes and content are created to achieve that attainment.

To transform the college into an OBE imparting institution, we are enhancing the quality of teaching and learning in the

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traditional education system.

In order to become an OBE imparting institution, the college has adopted an effective continuous feedback method to understand the needs and suggestions of all stakeholders.

While designing the courses of all programs in the college, we have kept in mind the needs of local, global, national, and regional requirements to achieve the goal of OBE more effectively. We have used the latest trends in the subject to design the courses. If necessary, we revise the course, and every department of the college makes every effort to provide courses that are useful for life-skills and livelihood.

Earlier, we used to give more importance to theory to evaluate students, but as our parent institution and college aim at outcome-based education, we have adopted new and effective techniques of evaluation such as case studies, project work, and internships as a part of CIE of students.

The college always tries to organize industry-oriented extension activities to meet the needs of entrepreneurs in the industrial sector. By increasing the participation of entrepreneurs in various activities of the college, the students are motivated through their guest lectures. Successful entrepreneurs are appointed on various college committees such as the Academic Council, Governing Body, BoS, CDC, etc., and their views are sought. The students are also enlightened by organizing guest lectures, seminars, conferences, workshops, etc. By mapping CO/PO attainment in a regular periodic manner, successful implementation of outcome-based education has become easier.

By implementing learner-centric activities, the objectives of the college are also being achieved.

20.Distance education/online education:

Distance education:

Vivekananda College is a reputed institution that currently offers B.Lib., M.Lib., MBA, M.Sc., M.A., and M.Com. courses through Yashwantrao Chavan Maharashtra Open University, which are being run successfully in the college. Additionally, some important courses such as the MBA program from Shivaji University are also conducted by the distance education department of this college. However, important approvals from UGC and other similar

bodies are required for awarding distance education degrees.

As Vivekananda College has not yet received the necessary approvals from the aforementioned authorities to grant such distance education degrees, we have not started offering the current courses through distance mode. But we plan to start such courses as soon as we receive permission from the relevant authorities.

Online Education:

Google Meet, WebEx, and Zoom are the technological tools used to deliver lectures and conduct online meetings. Institutional LMS platforms and YouTube are used to broadcast video content, while the institutional LMS platform is used to create and run skill enhancement courses successfully.

Our faculty members use smart classrooms, smart boards, PPTs, etc., to make classroom teaching more interactive and effective. The use of blended learning methods is a key factor in enhancing the effectiveness of our teaching and learning process.

1.1 - Curriculum Design and Development

1.1.1 - Curricula developed and implemented have relevance to the local, national, regional and global developmental needs which are reflected in Programme Outcomes (POs), Programme Specific Outcomes (PSOs) and Course Outcomes (COs) of the various Programmes offered by the Institution.

Vision and Mission: Dissemination of Education for Knowledge, Science and Culture

Designing POs, PSOs and COs: The Programme Outcomes (POs) of the 22 different academic programmes - spanning conventional, professional, and vocational branches - are designed to impart career oriented as well as value-based education aimed to

nurture expert professionals, aware citizens and sensitive human beings. The methodical structuring of POs, PSOs, and COs helps to make them focused on global, national, regional and local needs. The IQAC reviews the relevance of the Outcomes and gives inputs. The alignment of COs with PSOs and POs is mapped by departments through a structured formula.

Syllabus Designing: The draft syllabi formed by the BoS go through the scrutiny of the Academic Council. The rootedness of the BoS members in the requirements and the changing trends of the market as well as departmental linkages and MoUs help incorporate precise global, regional and local needs in the curricula.

Value Added Courses (e. g. Fashion designing, Excel for beginners, Python, Industrial Waste Water Management) capacitate students with the specific skills needed for employment. The 'Foreign Language Centre offers courses in German and French.

Outcome assessment: The college strives to impart Outcome Based Education (OBE) at every step in the curriculum delivery. The attainment of Outcomes by the students is assessed through innovative and activity-based continuous learning and evaluation.

Feedback Mechanism: The college collects feedback on the curriculum from stakeholders which helps in tracking the attainment of CO-POs.

1.3 - Curriculum Enrichment

1.3.1 - Institution integrates cross-cutting issues relevant to Professional Ethics, Gender, Human Values, Environment and Sustainability, and Human Values into the curriculum

The development of professional ethics and human values among students is embedded in the core objectives of the college. The college channelises the emphasis on values and ethics through Learning Outcomes. The syllabi carry a large emphasis on engendering sensitivity towards nationalism, gender justice, the environment and the development of professional behavioural ethics.

Professional Ethics: Student seminars help them develop presentation skills and mannerisms. Group discussions enrich students in the art and ethics of conversation and debate. Participative learning activities help them grow the habit and skills of teamwork. Industrial visits organised by departments groom students by exposing them to a professional environment.

Gender: Apart from the inclusion of topics on gender like Feminism, Women's Empowerment, Women's Movement, etc, the college organises many activities through Smt. Sushiladevi Salunkhe Stri Abhyas Kendra for gender sensitization in the campus.

Environment and Sustainability: The college paid special attention to the question of the environment in planning the various activities. The college offers Environment Science as AECC in the second year of all graduate programmes. The scientific knowledge and significance of Environment and sustainability is stressed widely in different streams.

Human values: All the programmes in college are inaugurated with the Sanstha prayer which is an emblem of higher human values. Different human and constitutional values are imparted through Compulsory (AECC) courses.

2.2.1 - The institution assesses students' learning levels and organises special programmes for both slow and advanced learners.

Making education accessible to underprivileged students and helping them in being employable, responsible members of the community has been the cause of our institution. To succeed in this task, our college remains vigilant at every stage of knowledge delivery and assessment of learning objectives. Right after admissions, the process of identifying slow and advanced learners starts based on their previous qualifying exam marks.

According to their performance in CIE and classroom interactions, academically weaker/slow students are provided with extra lectures, personal counseling, Bridge courses, remedial teaching, and required study material. Teachers encourage slow learners through Bi-lingual teaching methods and the provision of ready-made notes to adapt to newer knowledge fields and to stay in the flow of education.

For advanced learners, different innovative modes of knowledge testing are practiced. They are provided with library access to advanced reference material and are motivated to undertake Special field projects, prepare case studies, participate in Group discussions, and write book reviews, and Film Analyses. They also participate in seminar presentations, Poster presentations, quiz competitions, debates, AVISHKAR, Marathi

Pandhravda, Vivekanand Jayanti saptah competitions, etc. Special mega-events like Vivekanand Mahotsav and Spandan are organized every year where advanced students take part in innovative competitions and exhibit their professional and research skills, thus providing a platform to assess their learning objectives. The slow learners get triggered by the success of advanced learners.

INFRASTRUCTURE AND LEARNING RESOURCES

4.1 - Physical Facilities

4.1.1 - The Institution has adequate infrastructure and physical facilities for teaching-learning, viz., classrooms, laboratories, computing equipments, etc.

The college campus which includes other sister institutes and the Head Office of the Shri Swami Vivekanand Shikshan Sanstha is spread over an area of 8 acres. Curricular and Co-curricular activities of the college are carried out in 04 huge buildings with elevators and generators (backup systems)viz., Main Building with Annex, Jr. College Building, New Building, and Library Building. The college is sufficiently well equipped in terms of physical infrastructure for existing academic programs and administration. There are well-furnished 39 classrooms available with sufficient lighting, wooden benches, blackboard/glass boards, LCD projectors, and electric fans to make teaching and learning effective. The college is administered from an air-conditioned, ICT equipped Principal cabin as well administrative block which is located at the first floor and ground floor of the Main Building respectively. For effective practical and research work, frequently renovated and updated 40 laboratories are available. The departments are airconditioned. There are well furnished 02 Seminar halls,2 smart classrooms with interactive smart boards, and 01 Auditorium available for academic and extra-curricular activities. There is a separate G + two-storied library building (8800 sq. ft. carpet area) with reference books, journals, effective e-learning resources, and reading rooms for boys and girls. The B.Voc. faculty provides an updated software lab for Animation, high profile photo studio, and a well-furnished foundry. Also, we have a language lab, commerce lab, and lecture capturing system. Physics and Chemistry labs are spread over two separate floors with dark rooms and high-calibre research facilities.

All functions like Issue - Return, Renewal. Reports generated, stock verification, OPAC, usage statistics, email, etc. are fully automated.

In the year 2022, the software was upgraded. The current version of this software is 3.8.0, which includes OPAC, Usage statistics, and an email system. SLIM-21 is a multi-user, multilingual package which computerizes all the in-house operations of the library. This software is user-friendly & can be handed/ operated by the staff easily.

The parent institute is vigilant in handling the financial affairs of the college. Its role is proactive in terms of generating financial resources from different funding agencies like UGC, DST, DBT, ICSSR, RUSA, ICHR, Autonomy, Parent Universities, central government agencies, state government, and NGOs. Proper utilization of funds with utmost transparency is done through PFMS under a strict monitoring mechanism, sending reports of utilization to the concerned funding agencies, and preparing quarterly and annual audited statements. Internal Audit (nonstatutory): It is undertaken by the audit section of the Parent Institute. The internal auditors check and verify receipt payment statements, scrutinize the ledgers and cashbooks, and tally government deductions are maintained regularly. External Audit (Statutory): It is conducted annually by an external C.A. Agency. They inspect, check and verify the receipt payment statements, and scrutinize the ledgers and cashbooks. Every year as per the UGC and RUSA norms, the college undergoes financial audits. Further, as per norms of the

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Government of Maharashtra Higher Education Department, the college conducts its financial audit by Accounts Officer (AO), followed by an audit by the Senior auditor, Joint Director Office, Higher Education, Kolhapur, and the final audit is conducted by Accountant General, Mumbai, for salary and nonsalary grants received from the government.

The college is constantly invoking to use cloth bags instead of plastic bags. Incinerators are provided in ladies' washrooms for hygienic and safe disposal of used sanitary napkins. Solid waste in college campuses is mainly waste paper. The waste generated in college is sold every year to the scrap yard. In offices and other places, we use one-sided used paper for reprinting.

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The college campus has a proper drainage system for the waste liquid. The college has a wastewater recycling unit in the area of the ladies hostel.

The college has installed 6 sanitary vending and disposal machines for the careful disposal of sanitary napkins. For practical purposes, students require cotton balls on a large scale. We disposed of these cotton balls through these machines. The ash generated from these disposal machines was used as manure in the year 2021-22.

E-waste generated in the college is collected in the department of electronics. Our college has entered into an MoU with Mahalakshmi Recyclers, an agency for proper disposal. Almost every year the Department of Electronics conducts an E-waste management workshop for to make awareness about E-waste.

Mostly concentrated acids or chemicals are not used in the college. If necessary to use concentrated chemicals, proper dilution is made before disposal.
