**Feedback Obtained**

Feedback is taken online from the students and teachers and offline from parents and alumni. The received feedback is analysed in Microsoft Excel. The feedback analysis report is presented before the concerned statutory bodies and decisions are taken to incorporate the feedback in the policy decisions. Feedback related to value added courses was taken from the outgoing students of the different disciplines. It suggested that students wanted the skill based add-on courses to be made mandatory in the graduation years. Accordingly, it

was decided in the Academic Council and then the Governing Body that students will do two value-added courses as per their choice from the list in their graduation period. Based on the students' feedback, a competitive examination centre and a personality development centre have been started in the college. Students' and alumni's feedback on curriculum was used in the selection of Value Added Courses to offer to students from amongst the many proposals by departments. The remarkable suggestions of the stakeholders are conveyed to the departments/BOS chairmen and after discussions in BOS meetings they are incorporated in the syllabus.

2.3.2 – Students mentoring system available in the institution? Give details. (maximum 500 words)

Our college provides mentoring as a support service to all students. In this concept, students are clubbed and assigned to the care of teachers. Teachers establish inter-personal communication to provide guidance related to academics, job, career and professional development. They take care that their mentees are informed regarding different opportunities in career advancement and personality development. Mentoring is a holistic process spanning formal and informal guidance. Students of all the graduation programmes were allotted to teacher mentors in November 2018. There were 158 teachers and 4416 students. The allocation was made faculty wise to facilitate mentoring on educational problems. The objectives of mentoring were conveyed to the mentors. The mentors were given the registers to maintain the record of issues addressed. Students were given counseling on their academic, financial and psychological problems by the mentors. To track the progress of students in academics, a comparative record of semester wise grades is maintained. Mentors identify skill gaps in mentees and help attain their potentialities to the fullest. Once the mentors map the career options and preferences of the students, they expose their mentees to various learning experiences and resources. A detailed student profile is maintained to facilitate mentoring process. Students are intimated about their performance and are counseled accordingly. Besides this, teachers address the problems they are approached with by students apart from allotted mentees. Informal parent teacher meetings are organized in the college and at the doorsteps of the students in order to communicate about the needs and progress of their wards.

4.4.2 – Procedures and policies for maintaining and utilizing physical, academic and support facilities - laboratory, library, sports complex, computers, classrooms etc. (maximum 500 words) (information to be available in institutional Website)

The finance officer of the college prepares the annual budget with the help of the Finance committee and CDC in the month of February and it is sent to the management to seek approval and sanction. Every year, the priorities are decided and the necessary allocations are made. Thus the college ensures optimal allocation and utilization of the available financial resources for maintenance and upkeep. The college has its own mechanism for maintenance and upkeep of the infrastructure facilities and equipments. The HoDs submit their

requirements to the Principal, the necessary steps are taken by the principal in this regard. The college provides masons, plumbers, carpenters, and other required human resources, and thus the regular and minor maintenance is done at the department level. In-campus lighting, pathways, electrical supply, water supply, sewage, LPG, air conditioning, teaching aids of the departments are maintained with the help of the college staff. The major maintenance and repairs are outsourced through external agencies through AMCs. The laboratory equipment and instruments are calibrated by the teaching and non-teaching staff of the respective departments before the commencement of annual practical examinations. For certain equipments, the stabilizers and air-conditioners are provided to maintain precision of the instruments. These devices are maintained and repaired through funds available in the college. The computers of different departments are maintained through a full time technician appointed for overall maintenance of the computers. For major problems, the external services are sought on the contract or need basis for which special provisions are made in the annual budget. The college has salaried staffs who are expert in electrical, carpentry, housekeeping, masonry, plumbing, painting, security, and generator maintenance. Their services are readily available on the campus. The sensitive equipments are located in proper places taking adequate measures for their protection and storage. The college has a power house with high tension electric supply with the transformer within the college campus. The college has also electric power generator of 169 KVA capacity. The voltage stabilizers have been installed for safety of sensitive equipments. Some equipments like FTIR Spectrophotometer are kept in an air conditioned room. Entire B. Sc. Computer laboratory is also fully air conditioned. The constant water supply is assured through the big underground storage which is a natural source of water available for the whole year. The rain water harvesting system is used to collect the water in the storage.

The Practice Under the scheme, "Shikshak Aplya Daari" we visit our students' homes. We make teams of 4 to five faculty members and allot one village to each team. The teams visit their respective villages in the evening. During the visit they meet the students and their parents and discuss various problems they face regarding their curriculum, transportation or any other issue. We also take their suggestions. After the visit the team prepares a report and on the basis of that report measures are taken to achieve the objective. 5. Evidence of Success 20 teams visited near about 30 villages and met more than 500 students and their parents. Students' major problems like transportation were identified and necessary measures were taken to resolve them. It has been observed that gradually students' attendance got improved. This activity has been appreciated by students, parents and other stakeholders. 6. Problems Encountered and Resources Required Basically, the students from the rural areas either belong to agricultural families or they have some small business shops. So parents were busy either in their farms or shops. Teachers have to go there and meet them. As team members used their own vehicles, the issue of commutation was resolved at their own levels so no their resources were required. Best Practice II 1. Title: Panchaganga Ghat Cleaning 2. Objectives of the Practice A practice conducted by Vivekanand College is "Panchaganga Ghat Cleaning". The main objective of this practice is to go to the Panchaganga river and maintain cleanliness in the premise of the river ghat along with spreading awareness about cleanliness among people. 3. The Context The Panchaganga River is one of the most important rivers of India located in Maharashtra. The river travels 81 kms and passes across major areas around Kolhapur city and rural area. People from the region always come to the river Ghat to throw their nirmalya (the garbage collected from holy places or the funerals etc) into the river. This makes the river polluted and the water undrinkable. 4. The Practice Every day (even on Sundays) our students and staff members visit the Panchaganga ghat and they do cleaning of the ghat. They dissuade people from throwing their nirmalya into the river. The students spread awareness about cleanliness among people in the morning time. 5. Evidence of Success Because of this practice most of the people stopped throwing nirmalya into the river and as a result, the quality of water of the river has improved. 6. Problems Encountered and Resources Required The nirmalya is a part of religious faith of the people. So, many times it became difficult to prevent people, especially from rural background, from throwing nirmalya into the river. So the team worked very patiently in order to prevent any communally sensitive issue.

Sc. And M. Sc. level). Since 2012 fifty five students of Vivekanand College have won this scholarship. This scholarship continues till the student continues his/her education. 36 students from our college are beneficiary of this scholarship at present which is worth Rs.28, 80, 000/- per annum. Vivekanand college students win maximum INSPIRE awards every year.
